With about 110,000 inhabitants, Trier is a lively and intriguing place. Its history has a history that dates back more than 2000 years, making it Germany's oldest city, but it also offers the cultural life of a contemporary university town.

Located on the banks of the river Moselle, Trier features a unique mixture of various architectural styles, ranging from the Roman period through the Middle Ages to modern times, and the historically saturated atmosphere contributes significantly to the great quality of life people enjoy in Trier.

This is further enhanced by the city's moderate size and its exceptional location. Trier is situated close to the scenic surroundings of the Eifel, the Hunsrück mountains' nature parks, and the vineyards along the Moselle valley.

A rich cultural life is made possible by such institutions as the TUFA, the Palais, the Trier Theatre and the European Academy of Fine Arts. Movies and theatre festivals, concerts, exhibitions, public readings, and wine festivals regularly enrich the lives of Trier's citizens. Additionally, close by Luxemburg has tempting offers with its fine museums, theatres, concerts and festivals.



HIGHLIGHTS

- Each semester the International Office at Trier University offers a three-and-a-half week orientation program before the start of the lecture period. The aim of the program is to prepare international students for studying at the university and help them to settle into living in Trier. The orientation program has four key components: German lessons, the completion of important administrative formalities, various information sessions as well as social and cultural activities.
- The Language Center offers up to 15 free German as a foreign language courses every semester. These courses are designed for different language levels and cover a variety of subject areas. They range from intensive courses for students with little knowledge of German (beginner level A2) to intermediate courses (B1, B2) and there are also specialized courses for students with advanced knowledge of German (C1, C2).



- Each semester the student initiative "Internationales Zentrum" (IZ) offers international students an intercultural mentoring program as well as advice and guidance. The IZ is not only there to help with all aspects of studies, but also organizes a varied program of social and cultural activities. This extensive program is rounded off by several day excursions and one short-break excursion per semester to a variety of German and European destinations.
