The part-time online master's study programmes at Wageningen University may take 3 to 4 years to complete. The general structure is a 2 year part time course-programme of 30 credits per year, followed by a tailor-made internship in year 3 and an master's thesis agreement in year 4. If you are able to spend approximately 40 hours per week in the third year on your internship and thesis, you should be able to complete the programme in 3 years.

Students who have to pay the institutional tuition fee 3 (Non-EU and non-EFTA nationals1)

Master's student will pay the <u>part-time</u> institutional tuition fee 3 (for non-EU/non-EFTA nationals), provided they register for no more than 39 credits of education in an academic year. If students attend more than 39 credits in a year, they will normally have to pay the <u>full-time</u> institutional tuition fee 3 in that year (see next page for more information on ic3).

Non-EU/non-EFTA students should take into account that four years of online part-time study will cost approximately €41,305 in tuition fees. If you do the online study in three years, you will pay approximately €39,370 in tuition fees. The estimate of costs of tuition fees based on four years of study and on three years are presented below.

In the above given estimate, travel, accommodation and living costs are not included. Incidentally, you will also have to buy books (also not included in the tuition fee). Tuition fee is paid per academic year. Wageningen University will send students who pay the institutional tuition fee mentioned an invoice. The tuition fees for the 1^{st} year of 10,285 has to be paid into our bank account before the deadline mentioned on the invoice. The institutional tuition fees for the following years will have to be paid before 1 July each year.

Payment in a currency other than euros should be equivalent to the above-mentioned amounts (differences in exchange rates are not acceptable).

Institutional tuition fees 3 (ic3): Students who do not meet the nationality requirement pay the Wageningen University institutional tuition fee 3. Please see the factsheet 'Online Master's students (part-time) - Tuition fees 2020-2021' for more information on the nationality requirement.

The part-time and full-time institutional tuition fees 3 (for non-EU/non-EFTA nationals) are determined by the Executive Board of Wageningen University each year.

Part-time online master's students pay the <u>part-time</u> institutional tuition fee 3, provided they do not register for more than 39 credits in an academic year. If they take more than 39 EC in an academic year, they will have to pay the <u>full-time</u> institutional tuition fee 3 rate in that year (with possible re-invoicing afterwards).

However, if the exceedance of 39 credits in a year is caused by a thesis and/or internship, than the exceedance might be reduced with (39-X) credits, where X stands for the number of credits taken in the previous year. If after reduction, the total does no longer exceed 39 credits, the student retains the right to the part-time rate.

The institutional tuition fees 3 for the academic years 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 are not yet known and will be determined in May 2021 respectively May 2022.
