Determination of tuition fees to be paid

Academic year 2019/2020



The tuition fee to be paid will be determined by Wageningen University after we have received your request for enrolment (via Studielink). The tuition fee is determined on the basis of the 'indication tuition fees' that we receive from DUO. If we do not have received an 'indication tuition fee' from DUO, we will calculate the tuition fee you have to pay on the basis of the information available at that moment regarding your nationality and your previous education.

The amount of the tuition fees to be paid will be communicated as soon as possible via Studielink as of 1 May 2019. First-year master's students who require a visa and/or residence permit, will be informed by email about the amount of institutional tuition fees to be paid after the decision on their admissibility to the master's has been issued.

If there has been a change in your nationality or degree obtained at the first day of your enrolment in 2019/2020, Wageningen University may decide to adjust the tuition fees charged.

For example, you have submitted a request for enrolment in a WU master's programme in February 2019 but you have obtained your first master's degree at a Dutch Institute for Higher Education in July 2019. This was not known at the time Wageningen University processed your request for enrolment for the master's programme and we have charged you the statutory tuition fee. In September, we are notified by DUO that you had earned another master's degree on September 1 and you are not entitled to the statutory tuition fee in 2019/2020. Instead of the statutory tuition fee you will have to pay the institutional tuition fee 2. We will then send you a new invoice for the institutional tuition fee 2 and ask you to pay the difference. When the difference is not paid, your enrolment will be terminated in accordance with Wageningen University regulations.
